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RICHMOND MAIN STREET RETAIL TRAINING PUTS YOUTH TO WORK

The Richmond Main Street Initiative conducted a retail training program for youth 16-21 from July 2-July 11 to address the need of businesses seeking to hire local workers. Businesses hired a trained youth worker from our program who worked through the summer and were paid by Richmond Main Street. Employers have the option of hiring the youth beyond summer if they desire.

Many employers have expressed the preference to "hire local youth" for summer jobs in retail but complained that Richmond youth were not prepared to work in that capacity. Richmond Main Street's Youth Readiness and Employment Training sponsored by Wal-Mart and the City of Richmond Community Development Block Grant provided a solution to this dilemma. The Youth Entrepreneur Program also known as Y.E.P. gave participants practical skills and information to fill the gap experienced by these businesses seeking local youth employees.

Richmond Main Street's executive director Amanda Elliott working with the City of Richmond Employment and Training Department, Outreach Coordinator Maria Garcia, and Retail Trainer/Consultant, Irma Lewis, evaluated the participants and created job matches between the youth and retail businesses within the Central Richmond Revitalization area.

The program trained and put to work 10 local youth with job readiness skills. The training included mock interviews and resume creation and development. Participants were recorded on video to preview and critique their presentation skills.



Participants were required to read from the book *Purple Cow Transform your business by Being Remarkable*, by **Seth Godin** and were provided with basic training on aspects of owning and managing a retail

business, marketing and product placement.

Special guests Manager, Mike Lancaster and Yvette Williams, Market HR Manager from the Richmond Wal-Mart store gave inspiring presentations to participants about the benefits of hard work, education, determination and the recipe for success. Contra Costa College Educational Specialist, Fred Jackson presented participants with an information packet about classes in business management and entrepreneurship. Students also visited and interviewed downtown business owners.

Kharisma Street, 17 began working for 1st Liberty Financial after completing the training preparation. Although, she has previous job training and experience, she is glad to have been able to participate in this program, which gave her more knowledge about business. "What I gained most from the training was learning more about how to be successful in business". "The youth training was in a great location, because I know a lot of people that live in this area."

Chabrala Davenport, 18 is a resident of Richmond and she expressed how convenient it is to have a program in her area available to her. "I experienced a positive learning environment." Chabrala has a volunteer background and was very pleased with the confidence building training she received. "I felt comfortable working with the staff and my peers, I am influenced to go for what I want in life." She is now employed by H and H Builders Inc.

Each participant who completed the program received a certificate of completion, and were encouraged to continue using the skills acquired through retail training.

All youth from the program were placed in downtown businesses such as Betty's Hair Connections, BJ's Optical, Grandpa's World Salvage, 1st Liberty Financial and Mary's Little Lamb.

Richmond Main Street intends to expand this program next year in our community building efforts to reach a broader

segment of youth throughout Richmond.



MUSIC ON THE MAIN CONCERTS: EMBRACING OUR COMMUNITY'S DIVERSE HERITAGE

STREETSCAPE IMPROVEMENT PROJECT COMING ALONG AS PLANNED



The Streetscape Improvement **Project's** redevelopment process is coming along as planned with construction crews working diligently from Harbor Way to 19th street. The City has awarded the (proposed

contract) Bay Cities Paving and Grading for several million for the reconstruction on of the Macdonald Avenue Streetscape Harbor Way to 19th Street Project.

The Streetscape Project was designed to make Richmond's Main Street more conducive to residential, retail, commercial and mixed use developments. The "Project's" improvements include replacement of street light fixtures, trash receptacles, benches bus shelters, bicycle accommodations, wider side-

walks and an abundance of parking. Landscape and storm drain improvements are also planned as a part of this revitalization effort. The construction now preceding from Harbor Way to 19th Street on the south side is scheduled to be completed by the end of the fall and then shift from 19th Street to Harbor Way on the north side.

The City's employment and training staff has been working closely with the Bay Cities Paving and Grading and their subcontractors to improve the local participation on all work performed by their company within the City of Richmond. Currently 30% of the workforce hours are performed by Richmond residents, per the employment ordi-

Exciting developments are happening in downtown Richmond. The new Richmond mixed-use transit center will soon be joined by a revitalized Nevin Park just a few blocks away, and façade improvements along the Avenue. This is an exciting time for Richmond Main Street residences and businesses. With a new regional shopping center, anchored by a brand new Target at Macdonald's east end, and this new streetscape taking place in our City we can anticipate a beautifully revitalized downtown as well as a revitalized community.
