headquarters. The Youth Entrepreneurship Program is a twoweek personal development and
retail readiness training program
for Richmond youth between
the ages of 16 and 21, preparing
them for job placement at downtown businesses for the summer.

YEP offers Richmond youth an introduction to a career path

as a small business owner or manager while providing practical skills needed for self-sufficiency and life enrichment. The program also aims to support businesses seeking well-trained youth employees.

YEP is a collaborative effort between RMSI's executive director Amanda Elliott, City of Richmond's Youth WORKS, and Retail Trainer/Consultant Vaneese Johnson, CEO of *On The Move Staffing*. The team

evaluated all participants for careful selection in the program.
